

Novelis Report for FY 2026 on Fighting Against Forced Labour and Child Labour in Supply Chains

Introduction

This report describes the actions taken by Novelis Inc. (“Novelis,” or the “Company”) during the financial year beginning April 1, 2025, and ending March 31, 2026 (“FY 2026”), to prevent and reduce the risk that forced labour or child labour is used at any step in its operations and supply chains pursuant to the requirements of Canada’s *Fighting Against Forced Labour and Child Labour in Supply Chains Act* (the “Act”). In this report, Novelis uses the term “modern slavery” to encompass slavery, servitude, human trafficking, forced labour (as defined in the Act), and child labour (as defined in the Act).

Novelis is committed to respecting human rights and to preventing forced labour and child labour occurring in any of its own operations or throughout its supply chains. Novelis is a signatory to the United Nations Global Compact, which includes a commitment to the elimination of all forms of forced and compulsory labour and the effective abolition of child labour, and also seeks to align its due diligence practices with internationally recognised standards such as the UN Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights.

Novelis is committed to regularly evaluating its systems and controls to better identify, assess and address risks of forced labour or child labour across its business and supply chains. In FY 2026, Novelis continued to enhance its responsible procurement practices, including by strengthening labour and human rights provisions within its Supplier Code of Conduct, undertaking an internal review of its Uyghur Forced Labor Prevention Act (“UFLPA”) compliance approach, and developing a new UFLPA training.

Our Structure, Activities, and Supply Chains

Novelis is a leading producer of flat-rolled aluminum products and the world’s largest recycler of aluminum. Novelis produces aluminum sheet and light gauge products primarily for use in the beverage packaging, automotive, aerospace and specialties (including building & construction, signage, foil & packaging, commercial transportation, and commercial and consumer products) markets. Novelis is a Canadian corporation formed under the *Canada Business Corporations Act* with its global headquarters in Atlanta, Georgia. Novelis has one active manufacturing facility in Canada – located in Kingston, Ontario – that produces specialty and industrial products for marine, transportation, and industrial applications with aluminum cold rolling, finishing, and annealing equipment.

As of the end of FY 2026, Novelis is the global parent company of 29 manufacturing operating facilities through its regional subsidiaries on four continents: Novelis Corporation in North America, Novelis do Brasil Ltda. in South America, Novelis Korea Limited and Novelis (China) Aluminum Products Co., Ltd. in Asia and Novelis Deutschland GMBH and Novelis AG in Europe. Novelis has approximately 12,750 employees worldwide, of which approximately 276 are based in Canada, and Novelis globally has annual net sales of approximately CAD \$13.4 billion for FY 2026.

Novelis has a broad supply chain, sourcing materials from an extensive network of domestic and international suppliers and distributors. The inputs required for Novelis’ operations are substantially comprised of the following:

- **Primary Aluminum**: Primary aluminum is aluminum that is mined, refined, and smelted into ingots of pure aluminum. Novelis relies on its suppliers for this input material and has focused on developing long-standing partnerships with key suppliers. Novelis North America predominantly sources primary aluminum from smelters located in the U.S. and Canada. Nearly all of Novelis’ primary aluminum is supplied via producers and traders under the London Metal Exchange (“LME”) guidelines and policies (“LME Registered Brands”).
- **UBC Scrap/Remelt Scrap Ingot/Class Scrap**: Novelis purchases scrap aluminum, including both post-consumer and post-manufacturing scrap, to be melted down and flat-rolled back into products for its customers. For its North American business, Novelis sources its post-manufacturing scrap from North American beverage packaging producers and automotive stamping production. Novelis sources its post-consumer scrap, primarily comprised of used beverage cans, from the North American aluminum scrap market.
- **Other Materials**: Novelis’ manufacturing process also requires various materials to mix with aluminum to create different aluminum alloys (each appropriate for different applications). Alloying materials include zinc, magnesium, manganese, and silicon, among others. Coatings and paints serve to enhance corrosion resistance, improve surface appearance, and add colour for aesthetic purposes. These materials are sourced from multiple countries, including the U.S., China, South Africa, and Brazil.

Novelis’ Kingston, Ontario, facility serves as an aluminum finishing plant with cold rolling, finishing and annealing equipment. As such, input materials for Novelis’ Canadian operations are nearly entirely comprised of aluminum coils from its North American subsidiary’s (Novelis Corporation) operations in Oswego, New York, much of which is processed at Novelis’ Kingston facility and is then exported back to the U.S. The Oswego, New York, plant sources all of its primary aluminum from producers and traders who are LME Registered Brands.

Our Policies and Due Diligence Processes

In the aluminum supply chain, as well as our other supply chains – as with any global supply chain – there may be modern slavery risks. Novelis implements a range of policies and due diligence measures to identify, assess and manage such risks.

Policies

Novelis is committed to ensuring it meets all legal requirements in each country in which it operates and that it serves. Novelis has in place policies designed to ensure that it effectively mitigates the risk of modern slavery in its business and supply chains and regularly reviews and updates such policies as needed. Key policies include:

- **Company Code of Conduct**: Novelis employees must comply with the Novelis Code of Conduct, which sets out the standard of ethics and respect for human rights and individual liberties that Novelis expects from all of its employees. All employees are expected to conduct themselves in a manner that assures customers, suppliers, and fellow employees are treated with respect, fairness, and dignity. If an employee becomes aware of illegal practices or observes behaviours or circumstances that the employee believes violate the Code of Conduct, Novelis encourages the employee to report the matter immediately, in line with the Company’s whistleblowing policy.
- **Supplier Code of Conduct**: Novelis expects every supplier to comply with the standards set out in this Code as minimum requirements. Novelis suppliers must ensure that they do not commit and are not involved in any human rights violations and adhere to a number of standards relating to prohibition of forced labour (including, for example, providing fair

remuneration and not forcing any person to work against his or her will) and child labour (namely not employing workers younger than the permissible age of employment in the relevant country or otherwise depriving them of schooling opportunities). Novelis also asks its suppliers to require their own suppliers to adopt similar standards, and suppliers are required to use reasonable efforts to promote compliance with the Novelis Supplier Code of Conduct within their own supply chains.

- [*Responsible Sourcing Policy*](#): Novelis prioritizes suppliers that align with the principles outlined in its Responsible Sourcing Policy. Suppliers must uphold human rights, avoid contributing to conflict or environmental harm, and ensure materials are ethically and sustainably sourced. The Novelis Responsible Sourcing Policy outlines expectations for labour conditions, environmental responsibility, workplace safety, anti-corruption practices, and transparency. Novelis also expects its suppliers to monitor and improve their own supply chains, disclose sourcing practices upon request, and support third-party audits. Suppliers are required to cascade these standards to their own suppliers and are encouraged to collaborate with Novelis on sustainable and ethical sourcing solutions.
- [*Novelis Human Rights and Forced Labor Policy*](#): Novelis expects its subsidiaries and affiliates and all of its employees, officers, directors and agents to uphold the principles outlined in its Human Rights and Forced Labor Policy as minimum standards. This includes strict prohibitions against all forms of forced labour, human trafficking, and child labour. Novelis affirms the right to fair remuneration, safe working conditions, and non-discrimination based on personal attributes or beliefs. The company is committed to promoting diversity, protecting data privacy, enabling collective bargaining, and maintaining a harassment-free workplace. Novelis also encourages open reporting of violations without fear of retaliation and strives to ensure that its entire supply chain aligns with these human rights standards.
- [*Novelis Responsible Minerals Sourcing Statement*](#): Novelis expects all suppliers to align with its Responsible Minerals Sourcing Statement as a minimum requirement. Novelis is committed to avoiding the use of minerals that may contribute to conflict or human rights abuses, particularly in Conflict-Affected and High-Risk Areas. Suppliers must exercise due diligence in sourcing tin, tungsten, tantalum, gold, cobalt, and mica, and provide documentation on mineral origin upon request. Novelis encourages smelters and refiners to participate in third-party assurance programs and reserves the right to terminate business with suppliers that cannot demonstrate responsible sourcing practices.

In line with international human rights due diligence standards, Novelis is committed to continually improving its due diligence processes. In this reporting year, Novelis conducted a risk assessment for human rights in its supply chain. For each supplier determined to present heightened forced labour risk due to the risk profile of the country in which the supplier is located, we issued an assessment to evaluate the supplier's capacity to manage human rights concerns. Among responding suppliers, Novelis found sufficient levels of maturity in those suppliers' management systems.

Risk Identification, Assessment and Mitigation

Novelis takes steps to identify and mitigate risks in its own operations. In 2015, Novelis became a member of the Aluminium Stewardship Initiative ("ASI"). Since then, many of Novelis' facilities, including the Kingston plant, have been certified under the ASI Performance Standard. The certification process includes auditing and in-person interviews relating to topics such as human rights, workers' rights, forced labour, child labour, and responsible sourcing.

Novelis monitors supplier compliance with the Novelis Supplier Code of Conduct through self-assessments, questionnaires/surveys, third-party audits at supplier sites, and certifications.

During the reporting period, Novelis has also taken steps to further enhance its monitoring of suppliers, including by working towards implementation of an auditing process whereby suppliers would be expected to develop and implement corrective action plans for gaps identified through assessments and audits, including with respect to any standards regarding modern slavery.

Suppliers are encouraged to be transparent with Novelis about supply chain challenges, and must inform Novelis immediately about any breaches in their supply chains related to human rights risks as outlined in the Novelis Supplier Code of Conduct, as far as such breaches have an impact on Novelis, and work to remedy all such violations, as necessary, with the support of Novelis. Novelis has not received notice from any supplier of any such breach in their supply chains related to human rights risks during the reporting period.

While Novelis' recycling business is several steps removed from the mining and production of primary aluminum, Novelis is committed to assessing and seeking to address potential risks deeper in the supply chain. For example, one potential area of modern slavery risk in the sector could be in the mining and refining of bauxite into alumina as such production activities may occur in jurisdictions with a high prevalence of modern slavery according to the Global Slavery Index. To address this potential risk, the primary aluminum inputted into Novelis' North American business is predominantly purchased from producers and traders who are registered with the London Metal Exchange (LME) and thus are subjected to the LME's human rights standards. To trade aluminum on the LME, a company must first undergo a rigorous certification process that ensures the metal meets strict quality, ethical, and sustainability standards. Once a member, the aluminum to be traded must be LME-approved, requiring producers to adhere to specific production and ethical standards, including compliance with the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) Due Diligence Guidance for Responsible Supply Chains of Minerals from Conflict-Affected and High-Risk Areas. The LME's Responsible Sourcing Policy requires all suppliers to conduct due diligence on their supply chains, which is aligned with international standards such as the OECD Guidelines for Multinational Enterprises on Responsible Business Conduct. The LME requires third-party audits on listed brands to assess compliance with the LME's responsible sourcing standards, including labour practices. Suppliers found to be in violation of these standards may face sanctions, including removal from the LME's list of approved suppliers.

In FY 2026, Novelis used a supply chain due diligence platform program in the European Union that has further enhanced our assessment of modern slavery risks in our supply chain. The digital platform uses artificial intelligence to predict, detect, and classify supply chain risks using data from a variety of public, private, and shared sources.

In FY 2026, Novelis also undertook an internal review of its UFLPA compliance approach. The primary objective of the review was to provide guidance and practical recommendations to support the organization in ensuring compliance and mitigating associated risks. The review produced helpful considerations and recommendations supporting continued enhancement of the program going forward.

In addition, by virtue of being the world's largest aluminum recycler, Novelis is committed to sustainability and has created workstreams towards reducing the amount of primary aluminum required for the production of its aluminum products (and consequently reducing the potential for modern slavery risk).

Grievance Mechanisms

Any party, including Novelis employees and workers in our supply chain, can use Novelis' third-party operated Ethics Hotline, which is in place in each of the countries in which the Company operates, to report concerns or suspected violations of the Novelis Code of Conduct and other company policies. The Ethics Hotline information is available on Novelis' website and the hotline

can be accessed by email and by phone. Novelis will investigate, address, and respond to suspected policy violations reported to the Ethics Hotline. Novelis does not tolerate retaliation against anyone who reports suspected violations of law or policy in good faith.

Under the Novelis Supplier Code of Conduct, Novelis suppliers are required to establish an appropriate complaint mechanism to enable persons to raise concerns about human rights risks, including violations of human rights obligations linked to the supplier's economic activities or in their supply chain.

Remediation

If any risk of modern slavery is flagged through Novelis' due diligence processes, we take steps to investigate and mitigate the risk, which may include remediation of any actual adverse impact identified. As we have not identified any specific instances of modern slavery in Novelis' operations and supply chains during the reporting period, the implementation of remediation measures have not been necessary. We have also not identified any instances of loss of income of the vulnerable families as a result of the steps Novelis has taken to eliminate risks of forced labour or child labour, and remediation has therefore not been necessary.

Training

Novelis requires that all employees receive training on the Novelis Code of Conduct, which includes a section on human rights and preventing modern slavery. In 2025, Novelis also launched UFLPA training for its procurement, supply chain, and trade teams to help them identify and appropriately respond to potential modern slavery risks in our supply chains.


Our Effectiveness in Combating Slavery and Human Trafficking

Novelis is continually working to ensure that respect for human rights and a commitment to preventing modern slavery pervade its operations and supply chains. Novelis periodically reviews the effectiveness of the measures it takes to ensure that forced labour and child labour are not being used in its business and supply chains, including by monitoring whistleblowing reports from employees and from members of the public. The Company also monitors whether investigations are undertaken by law enforcement agencies and regulators that indicate that modern slavery practices have been identified.

Statement of Approval

This report is made pursuant to section 11 of the Act and constitutes our report for the financial year ending on March 31, 2026. It was reviewed and approved by the board of directors of Novelis Inc. on May 15, 2026, pursuant to paragraph 11(4) of the Act.

This report is approved and attested, as required under subsection 11(4) and subsection 11(5) of the *Fighting Against Forced Labour and Child Labour in Supply Chains Act*.
